A Message From Your Mayor Howdy Friends and Neighbors,

"One of our biggest attractions here in Maggie Valley is Jonathan Creek. The creek starts at the top of the mountain and flows downward into the heart of Maggie Valley. The creek has several tributaries, like Campbell Creek, which make it a free-flowing beautiful part of what Maggie Valley is." This was the opening line from my first newsletter to you as Mayor in 2020.

As a town, we have been through a lot these past four years. The real story began five months after I was elected Mayor, COVID 19. In the first few months of COVID, I made choices to protect our citizenry and those that work for the town. Working with the Town Board of Aldermen and Town leadership, we came together with forward thinking to execute the 4th of July fireworks, as well as collaborating with promoters reschedule events at our Festival Grounds. During this same time, Haywood County completed a property re-evaluation. The results of this re-evaluation allowed the Board of Aldermen, in 2021, to lower the tax rate to forty cents per \$100 taxable value. To this day, Maggie Valley has the lowest tax rate in Haywood County, while continuing to give our taxpayers great services and staying **DEBT FREE**.

The election in 2021 saw two new people join the Board of Aldermen, Jim Owens, and John Hinton. This past year and a half, the Town staff and Board of Aldermen

have been busy completing our Veteran's Memorial Park, completing our Unified Development Ordinance and with your help, we completed and voted in our new Comprehensive Plan as well as our new Land Use Plan. NC DOT should complete our upgraded crosswalk project before freezing weather sets in. In the past few years, the Town has purchased the 'Sweet Briar' property across the street from the Festival Grounds, and the 'Ferguson' property in front of the Festival Grounds. This winter, the town will make the first property a completed parking lot and will plan for the new property in front of the Festival Grounds.

With new faces comes new leadership. I want to congratulate Vickie Best on being promoted to Town Manager. Manager Best has been working hard to select the best folks available to help run the town. Congratulations to Sam Cullen for being promoted as Town Planner and Captain Matthew Boger for being promoted as Chief of Police. Welcome to the family Kathy Johnson, the new Town Clerk, as well as Tasha Gubernath, the new Finance Director. These employees are working hard to deliver the great service you are used to. The Town of Maggie Valley continues to grow and prosper.

Another election year is here. Looking back at the past four years, we have accomplished a lot together. As your Mayor, I want to thank each of you for your continued support. While it is great to talk about those things we have accomplished, I know we have so much more to do. On

Tuesday, November 7th, 2023, we have an election to fill two Aldermen seats and elect a mayor. Know the issues and know the candidates, **YOUR VOTE MATTERS**. Together we can continue to grow and check off the list of things yet to do.

I want to thank the citizens of Maggie Valley and the surrounding community for your support these past ten years that I have served. Stay informed, stay engaged, and together we can continue to define our destiny. It is my pleasure to serve as your mayor. 

Education

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics has conducted several studies and published several scholarly articles regarding the correlation between educational attainment and income. It has been proven over time that "the more you learn, the more you earn." There has been a general increase in the educational attainment of the Maggie Valley population. In 2010, the highest educational level of the majority of the population was a high school degree. In 2020, the majority had some college education. The Town also saw an increase in the percentage of residents with Associate and Bachelor's degrees in 2020.

Can the grease!

Pouring cooking grease down the kitchen drain is a recipe for disaster! Substances build up in your home's plumbing and in the Town of Maggie Valley's sewer system. That's bad news for your pipes and ours! Why? Clogged pipes cause sewage to back-up into your home, yard, streets, or waterways. How can you help? **Never pour grease down the drain!**



Instead pour cooled grease into an empty can and place it in the trash. Put strainers in sinks to catch scraps and empty them into the trash. Use rubber scrapers and paper towels to remove oil and grease from cookware. Scrape food scraps into the trash and avoid using a garbage disposal for food waste.

CURBSIDE SERVICES

Garbage & Recycling Pick-up

One of the Town's most popular residential services is weekly curbside garbage and recycling pickup. Garbage is on Monday and recycling is on Tuesday. Curbside pickups may be affected by holidays! For changes in the service schedule, check online at https://maggievalleync.gov/

Place bins at the curb before 7 am!



The Town provides residential customers with a 95-gallon brown bin to manage bagged household garbage and a 64-gallon blue bin for clean loose mixed recyclables. Containers are available for pick-up or delivery to new customers. Lost or stolen containers may be replaced for a charge.



Please recycle glass jars, plastic bottles, metal cans, paper, and cardboard. These items should be rinsed and may be mixed together in the blue toter. NO BAGS please! AS NEEDED SERVICES

Yard Debris Pick-up

Pick-up is provided for bagged trimmings & leaves, limbs, brush, branches, etc. Please use the paper yard bags or black plastic bags. Brush, branches, and limbs (no longer than 12 feet in length and no larger than 4" in diameter) should be piled with cut ends facing the street.

White Goods Pick-up

Provided for stoves, refrigerators, gas grills, washers, dryers, microwaves, freezers, and other discarded appliances.

E-Waste Pick-up

Provided for discarded **printers**, **TVs**, **copiers**, **computers**, etc.



County Solid Waste

Please call Haywood County Solid Waste at 828-627-8042 for disposal information, as carpet, fluorescent light bulbs, tires, building materials, mattresses, paint, and old furniture will not be picked up by the Town.

SNOW & ICE REMOVAL

The Town of Maggie Valley provides snow and ice removal on all Town Maintained Streets and several privately maintained roads during winter storm events. 

2023 Tax Payment Options

Pay Online

The payment system allows you to pay by Visa, Mastercard, American Express, or Discover. Please note there is a transaction fee of \$1.25, plus a 3% convenience surcharge. To pay online, please visit https://maggievalleync.gov/ and click Pay Taxes Online.



Pay by Mail

Make a check payable to the Town of Maggie Valley and pay by mail. Please include the bottom portion of your tax bill and write your parcel identification number in the memo field of your check. We accept postmarks as date received for tax payments. If you would like to receive a receipt, include your email address or a stamped self-addressed envelope.

Pay in Person

Feel free to come into Town Hall to pay at the Front Office window. For those of you who are in a hurry, or after hours, the Drop Box will be your best option (checks only), located in the metal door under the overhang, on the east side of the building. Please include the bottom portion of your tax bill and write your parcel identification number in the memo field of the check. If you include your email address, we will email your receipt.

Maggie Valley's Big Sweep Event
