#### A Message From Your Mayor

Dear Friends,

Sometimes we forget the beautiful mountains and scenery that we live in. It is a great feeling to look out the window and think this is such a perfect place to live, I am so lucky!

The Aldermen and myself realize how special our Town is and we try our best to provide the highest quality of service for all of our citizens. The Town's tax rate is once again at \$0.43, which is the lowest municipal tax rate in Haywood County. I am proud to say that this is the third year we have had this rate, while continuing to provide citizens with outstanding services and making substantial investments for our Town.

If you haven't visited the Town's website, <a href="https://maggievalleync.gov">https://maggievalleync.gov</a>, I hope you will. The Board is very proud of the website and the information is being consistently updated for you. A new playground was constructed behind Town Hall in the park with the basketball court, walking path and horseshoe pits. The playground features a number of fun attractions for all ages of children. While the children are playing, Mom,

Dad and friends can prepare a meal on the new grills and use the picnic tables under the Picnic Shelter. Mary Rathbone Rich Memorial Park, Parham Park and Town Hall Park all have new 'unified' rock signs and Wi-Fi has been installed to improve your user experience.

I hope you have noticed the beautiful flower barrels throughout the valley. More barrels are needed to really stand out and we are asking citizens to adopt barrels, making them spectacular and keeping them watered and looking great!

A new welcome sign has been created at the intersection of Soco Road (US Hwy 19) and Jonathan Creek Road (US Hwy 276) for residents and visitors entering from the east. An identical sign was constructed last year at Mary Rathbone Rich Park to welcome those entering from the west.

The Town and Haywood Waterways have joined forces for a Streambank Restoration project at Elevated Park, behind Elevated Mountain Distillery. The old school bus that had been in the creek for years is now gone and it is so beautiful and surreal there.

The Town, along with the Home


Owners Associations upgraded three Non-Powell Bill streets: Hemlock Loop, Saddle Drive and Nottingham Road. The Board installed a muchneeded Fire Alarm and Security System in the Town Hall building. We are in the process of upgrading the telephone system, financial management system and creating a new citizen inspired app for your smartphone.

I did not sign up for re-election this year so I will no longer be your Mayor as of this December. It has truly been a joy representing the people of Maggie Valley over the years and I have appreciated your support. #### From the Town Planner

A new decade begins January 1, 2020 and the 2020s in Maggie Valley promise a bright future. The year 2020 will also mark the 24th United States Census. It is extremely important that all Maggie Valley residents respond to the Census so that there is an accurate count of our population. The results of the 2020 Census will determine the number of seats for each state in the House of Representatives. The state and federal government will also use the results of the Census to help allocate funding to local communities for roads, schools, hospitals, emergency services, and more. April 1, 2020 is National Census Day and by this date, households will receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census. This year there are three options for responding: online, by mail, or by phone. Let's make sure everyone in Maggie is counted!

Speaking of counting, during the first nine months of 2019, more than seventy-five zoning permits have been issued for new construction and development projects in Town. Fourteen of these permits were for new residences. The Town has also issued 32 Notice of Violation letters this year, most all of which have been remedied. This is an ongoing process and the Town appreciates everyone's hard work to help keep our extraordinary valley maintained. Other noteworthy ways we worked in 2019 to maintain the Town included the planting of thousands of new plants and flowers at the Town's parks. These enhancements have been made at the Mary Rathbone Rich, Elevated, and Town Hall Parks. Please visit one of our numerous parks and enjoy a few relaxing minutes, or hours. It is also notable that in 2019 I was privileged to have participated in "Leadership Haywood," a professional development course offered by the Haywood Chamber of Commerce and Economic Development Council. Over several months I learned much about this great community and how Maggie Valley plays a vital role as an important partner in a very unique and special County. The next year will offer many exciting things to come and it's shaping up to be a great 2020 and new decade in Maggie Valley!

# Are you paying Occupancy Tax on your rental accommodations?

If you rent out your home or vacation property for periods of less than 90 days, State of North Carolina and Haywood County law requires you to collect a 4% occupancy tax (in addition to NC sales tax) from your guests. You must first register your rental property with the Haywood County Finance Office, which will instruct you on how to remit the occupancy tax money you collect. The Haywood County Finance Department can be reached at 828-452-6629.

#### **From the Police Chief**

The Maggie Valley Police Department is proud to be of service to our citizens of Maggie Valley. As always, we value community engagement with our officers and staff, in problem solving and enhancing our community. Our agency would like to take this opportunity to share events and changes that have occurred in our police department over the past year, and mention our community partners that have assisted our Police Department. We would like thank all those who brought our officers and staff cakes, pies, cookies, and refreshments. We deeply appreciate you and your friendships. To our business owners, which have been so gracious in supporting our officers and staff, we greatly appreciate you and your employees.

Our officers continue to build on our relationships with our business leaders by regular visits where we interact and engage in community discussions. We have interacted with Homeowners Associations to address their community concerns, how to resolve issues and create a safer environment. We continue to track our neighborhood patrols and business visits. A vital part of our policing initiative is to maintain a positive working relationship with our community. Please feel free to contact or come by our office with any

concerns you might have. Our police officers and staff are at your service.

Our agency recognizes outstanding officers by presenting them our "Excellence in Policing" award. Officers eligible for this award have to meet certain criteria in work performance. This past year we recognized Officer William Sterrett for his outstanding service, dedication, and devotion to our agency's goals. Ko Officer Logan Wood has developed our K9 program to include, not only illegal contraband searches, but tracking lost, missing, or wanted persons. Moses, our canine, has successfully tracked several persons eluding arrest out in the field. Officer Logan Wood and Moses competed in the United States Police Canine Association field trails (USPCA). This year the USPCA trials were held in Maggie Valley at our festival grounds. These trials take on a form of competition, but are primarily used for K9 certification in tracking, article searches, and illegal contraband. We would like to congratulate Office Wood and Moses on obtaining their K9 certifications.

Our agency would like to welcome two new police officers, Alan Williams and Shanna Bellows. Patrol Officer Ryan Flowers has been appointed to Sergeant. Sergeant Flowers was one of the first recipients of our "Excellence in Policing" award and is our lead "Field Training Officer". Officer William Sterrett continues teaching D.A.R.E. at Jonathan Valley Elementary School. Officer Sterrett stays current on the latest teaching methods by attending the annual D.A.R.E. conference held in Wilmington N.C.

Our agency is committed to public safety, and continued education is key in our commitment. We require Officers to train and educate themselves to better serve our community. Our Police Officers attend annual training at the North Carolina Justice Academy for focused training, and Haywood Community College for annual in-service training. We have Officers that are now attending college to obtain their A.A.S. degree and or Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice or related field. Our permanent radar signs, located on US Hwy 19, are still in service, alerting motorist to drive at a safe speed. Prescription drugs are still at the forefront of public concern. We maintain a Prescription Drop-Off box located at the front entrance of our Police Department. I would like to thank all those that deposit unused prescription drugs at our office for destruction.

Our Maggie Valley Police officers are dedicated, and proudly serve the residence of Maggie Valley. We take every opportunity to better serve our community and keep "Excellence in Policing" as the standard of service. We look forward to partnering with you in the future.

## Can the grease!

Pouring cooking fats and grease down your kitchen drain is a recipe for disaster! These substances build up in your home's plumbing and in the Town of Maggie Valley's sewer system and that's bad news for your pipes and ours. Why? Clogged pipes can cause raw sewage to back-up into your home, yard, streets or waterways.

How can you help prevent grease buildups from blocking sewer lines? Never pour grease down the sink drain, even with dish soap and hot water! Scrape food scraps from pans and dishes into a trash can or garbage bag.

Mayonnaise, salad dressings and other food items that contain fats and oils can clog pipes too. Pour cooled grease into an empty can or bottle and place it in the trash. Use rubber scrapers and paper towels to remove oil and grease from cookware. Avoid using your garbage disposal for this waste. Put baskets or strainers in sinks to catch food scraps, and empty them in the trash can.

## **Our Curbside Services:**

### **Garbage & Recycling Service**

One of the Town's most popular residential services is our weekly curbside garbage and recycling pickup. As most of you that use the service know, garbage pick-up is on Monday and recycling on Tuesday. Curbside garbage and recycling pickups may be affected by holidays! Check the website home page for any changes in our service schedule.

In addition to providing these pickup services, the Town provides residential customers with one 95 gallon brown toter to better help you manage your garbage and a 64 gallon blue recycling toter. For those who haven't gotten their containers, they are available for pick-up or we will deliver them to your home. \*Lost or stolen containers may be replaced for a charge.\*

#### Yard Debris Pick-up

This service is provided for bagged trimmings & leaves, limbs, brush, branches, etc.
Brush, branches and limbs (no longer than 12 ' in length and no larger than 4" in diameter) should be piled with cut ends facing the street.

### White Goods Pick-up

This service is provided for stoves, refrigerators, gas grills, washers, dryers, microwaves, freezers and other discarded appliances.

#### E-Waste Pick-up

This service is provided for discarded printers, TVs, copiers, computers, etc.

## **Maggie Valley Town Parks**

The Town of Maggie Valley has a number of parks, each with its own unique amenities that allow residents and visitors the opportunity to relax, refresh and recharge.

Mary Rathbone Rich Memorial Park (4538 Soco Road) has a Picnic Pavilion & Restrooms, Wi-Fi, Walking Path, Lions Club Sensory Garden and Jonathan Creek Access.



Parham Memorial Park (1861 Mood Farm Road; Intersection of Soco Road) has a Picnic Pavilion & Restrooms, Wi-Fi, Walking Path, Grills and Jonathan Creek Access with Fishing Deck.



**Elevated Park** (3723 Soco Road behind Elevated Distillery) has a Picnic Shelter, Grill and Jonathan Creek Access.



**McCracken Corner Park** (Intersection of Moody Farm Road and Soco Road at stoplight) has Pergola Seating, Picnic Tables, Grills and parking for walkers and bikers.



**Mountain View Creek Walk** (Intersection of Mountain View Drive and Moody Farm Road) has two staircase Jonathan Creek Access Points, Picnic Tables, Grills and a Walking Path.



**Town Hall Park** (3987 Soco Road behind Town Hall) has a new Playground and Picnic Shelter, Basketball Court, Horseshoe Pits, Grills, Walking Trail and access to Restrooms located inside Town Hall during business hours and in the Town Hall Pavilion at other times.
